Enshrined in the college insignia, the motto "विद्ययामृतमश्नुते" or as translated literally "Knowledge is the key to immortality", stands for the vision with which the institution served society through imparting quality education for over half a century. In the process a set of core values emerged over the years to foster welfare and development of the society in general and the student community in particular. It aims at upliftment of society in particular and humanity in general. Providing affordable education of national standard is of paramount significance. The vision also envisages constant pursuit of academic excellence through curriculum and support programmes. Providing best academic practice along with the augmentation of the spirit of national integrity and fraternity have been the proclamation of the college. Last but not the least, relentless striving to emerge as a centre of potential excellence through dedication and hard work is the prime target of the college.

To achieve the above mentioned vision, an ideal mission is being set, in order to achieve excellence in every sphere. Maharaja Bir Bikram College directs its endeavour to the optimal utilisation of the available resources and the infrastructural facility. It seeks to improve the quality of undergraduate programmes preparing the students to cope up with the ever changing environment. As a result of it, the college attract students of high calibre and competence. The college also endeavours to nurture the sense of social responsibilities and commitment in the student community. Enhancing scholastic acumen and multidimensional efficiency among students besides making them morally sound and strong in a holistic manner is the crux of the mission of the college.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The already established management information system of the college is fully effective.

- Bulk SMS: Bulk SMS are transmitted to the stakeholders on administrative meeting, policies and regulations.
- Admission exercise: Indigenously developed software is operational in the last decade.
- Automated Library: Library being the key organ of an academic institution is almost fully automated at present.
- Teachers council: Teachers council with its different organ participants in the management process as a second fiddle to the Principal
- HODs of different faculties: The HODs meet with the Principal for solving different departmental issues.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The curriculum development is facilitated by the experience teachers who happen to be the members of board of studies under TU. Almost twenty eight teachers of across 24 department of the college have served the curriculum development in this way.

The teachers uses their academic experiences and feedback from alumni and parents to design the curricula in an effective way.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teaching and learning are improved and made effective in the following way:

- Feedback from students on regular basis
- Provision of facility of two IT enabled library
- Access to Wi-Fi facilities and smart classrooms etc.
- Free Internet facilities
- Arranging Special lectures by eminent persons & workshops

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- The examination committee, constituted by the teachers' council, handles the every face associated with the conduction of internal examination. The same committee also conducted all the university examination as per the guidelines adopted by the affiliating University.
- The evaluation of the answer scripts at the internal level are made by the respective teachers on a rational basis. However the University appoints examiners, scrutinizers, and head examiners on the basis of competence and experience and they are asked to evaluate in coordination and just manner. The secrecy is strictly maintained.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Some of the faculty members are actively engaged in research works. At present Six Minor Research Project funded by UGC are running and one Major Research Project funded by DBT, New Delhi, is in final stage. Many faculty members are publishing research paper on regular basis and posses some collaborative works.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Library is fully automated. It has a lot of text & reference books including some rarer hooks
- ICT facilities are utilized both for academic and administrative excellence
- Internet Wi-Fi zone, smart class room etc are using effectively
- Seminar Block has been renovated very recently
- The science laboratories have been continuously upgraded. New and sophisticated tools, instruments and appliances are installed.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

To manage the human resources the authority recommended the teachers and non-teaching staff to participate in several career advancement programmes & other trainings time to time. Students are also encouraged to participate in debates seminars, workshops.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Permanent teaching faculties are recruited by the TPSC and ministerial staff are recruited by the Higher Education Department according to the guidelines set by the state govt.

However guest faculties are engaged by the Institution on the basis of the departmental necessities.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Primarily the institution is exploring opportunities of industry interaction in probable cases in state level. However, some collaborative works are in practice.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The admission process of the college is very distinct and regulated by the Directorate of Higher Education , Govt. of Tripura. The candidates are selected on merit and reservation basis and admitted just according to the number of seats available to each departments (Honours and General Level) as approved by the affiliating University. The confirmed and waiting panels are uploaded to the college wave site. The IQAC and admission committee look after & control the entire process.

- A device for management of hazardous wastes is under process.

WEAKNESS:

- The dropout rate still remains an unresolved problem despite efforts to reverse the trend.
- The strength of teaching faculty is less than optima
- Job oriented and skill development courses could not be introduced.
- The pass out rates of students are not up to the level of satisfaction, though it quite encouraging.
- The transportation system could not be developed till now

OPPORTUNITIES:

- The college has such infrastructure that PG courses can be introduced in subjects.
- The research works of the faculties can be strengthened in a big way.
- The infrastructure of the college has opportunity of further expansion.
- Sports facilities, like starting indoor coaching / training centre, multi-purpose gymnasium may be introduced.
- Some of the science-based subjects with high potential job opportunities like geology, biochemistry, electronics and biotechnology can be introduced here at UG level.
- The practice of campus interview and employment can be persuaded to take place.

***** CHALLENGES:

- Lowering the drop-out rate among the students is a major challenge which remains long unresolved.
- Quality education in true spirit of is another challenge which is to be resolved to enhance the chance of employability of pass outs.
- The financial allocation to the institution is lagging behind the requirement for phenomenon development.
- Number of faculty members is inadequate posing another big challenge for effectual education.
- Inadequate number of ministerial staff constrains the accountability and agility of administration.

8. Plans of Institution for next year

The institution has chalked out the following future plans for next year:

- Actual drop out rate will be reviewed time to time. Proper step will be taken for retaining the
 continuing students.
- ICT based teaching learning will be emphasized by providing facilities in different departments.
 Normal teaching-learning method is strengthen by motivating existing teachers and engaging Guest Teacher.
- PG courses will be introduced in all streams (Science, Arts & Commerce). From the next academic session Physics, Chemistry & Commerce may be introduced in phase manner when granted by affiliating university.
- Geology, Anthropology and Biochemistry may be introduced from academic session 2017-18 as per higher education guidelines.
- Steps will be taken to improve the condition of laboratory, canteen, classroom furnitures. Appropriate authority has been requested to take initiative for proper transportation in the college.
- A large number of books and journals to be purchased.
- An initiative will be taken for strengthening the existing placement and career guidance cell.
- Further drinking water facilities will be extended.
- Initiative is to be taken to strengthen the existing feedback system by putting a structured form from the stakeholders.
- The entrepreneurship development cell for the purpose will be strengthened by involving different concerned agencies.
- The case method and interactive method of teaching will be introduced in the departments phase by phase. In some departments, specially in science, this method may be introduced.
- Academic Audit will be done within the college by the college itself.
- Some national and international seminars, workshop and other educative programmes will be conducted.
- The college itself will take a project related with green campus in collaboration with related authorities.
